What is the Census and Why is it Important?

- As mandated by Article I, Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution, the census takes place every 10 years.
- The U.S. Census counts every resident in the United States once, and only once.
- Answers are Protected by Title 13. The Census is Confidential and required by Law.
- The data collected by the census determines...
 - The number of seats each state has in the U.S. House of Representatives (a process called apportionment) and
 - 2. How much federal funding is distributed to state and local governments





What's at Stake for California

Power

- Congressional representation
- Reapportionment and redistricting

Money

• ~\$7 Billion annually (California Department Education)





U.S. Census Bureau Census 2020 Goal

Ensure that everyone is counted once, only once, and in the right place.

California Complete Count Mission

Ensure that Californians get their fair share of Federal resources and Congressional representation by encouraging the full participation of all Californians in Census 2020.





Roles — Federal vs State

US Census 2020

- Conducts the enumeration
- Ensures everyone is counted one time, in the right place

CA Census 2020

- Conducts a state-wide campaign
- Ensures the hardest-to-reach Californians are educated and motivated to participate










Census 2020 Student Ambassadors

- The Foundation's Ambassador Programs train community college students to serve as advocates on campus and in their surrounding communities
- 50 Student Ambassadors recruited from colleges in counties with high hard-to-count indexes in all 10 regions, will work to reach approximately 50,000 students
- Participants will receive comprehensive training to educate their peers in how to complete the census and why it is so important to communities across California
- Ability to speak languages other than English is a plus





Student Network Activation

- Leverage the existing networks of student government groups, clubs, and community-based organizations serving CCC students to ensure Census participation
- California community college affiliated organizations or student groups in all 10 regions will be eligible for scholarships up to \$5,000
- Funding will support outreach events in their community and on campuses to promote the Census
- Focus efforts on organizations that can provide targeted outreach to historically underrepresented students






Priority Colleges

 Priority Colleges are colleges located in California Hardto-Count (CA-HTC) communities determined by the California Census.

 The California Hard-to-Count (CA-HTC) Index is based on multiple demographic, housing and socioeconomic variables correlated with an area being difficult to enumerate.

• Census tracts with higher indexes are likely to be places that will pose significant challenges to enumerate in 2020.
